You may have heard..... Anderson County has implemented a 90-day moratorium on new housing developments - a "pause" to address infrastructure concerns. Growth is occurring too fast to keep up. The Post and Courier reported, "If recent trends continue, Anderson County expects to add 7,500 more houses by the end of the decade, according to the county."

Now, perhaps more than ever, we must keep the scriptural mandate of the Great Commission and the mission of The United Methodist Church front and center.

**Matthew 28: 19 -** Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

The "Missional Priorities Jeremiah Team", as the Conference named it, believes that the first word in Matthew 28:19 is too often overlooked ... .and I agree with them. **Go!** That is the word. It is an action word, an imperative. It is the first step that we have sometimes forgotten.

Can you imagine Peter and Paul thinking that they would just continue to teach from the synagogue? Or from their own homes? Can you imagine Paul not traveling to Corinth, or Rome, or Thessalonica? Can you imagine John and Charles Wesley not going out into the fields, the prisons, or across the pond to America?

But we cannot forget the fact that The Great Commission tells us to GO. Go therefore into the new subdivisions and housing developments. Go into the new restaurants and coffee shops. Go into the new and old places where people gather and share the good news of Jesus Christ that God loves them, and is for them. And invite them to come experience that loving community of Christ right here at Trinity UMC.

#### Red Shoe Reflections with Rev. Kathryn

I have moss balls in a fishbowl in my office. They are not exactly exciting things. These Marimo balls are technically balls of algae that originate in shallow cool water in areas of Japan and Iceland. They form into balls because they just roll along with the current in the water. But they are low maintenance and are pretty alongside the glass fish in the bowl.



Moss balls also don't grow very fast, adding to the low amount of maintenance required, they don't outgrow their space. They make for great pets in that I don't feed them, they don't make noise and they don't grow. Change the water every so often and they are happy. They make me smile but really they don't do anything.

As I was cleaning their bowl the other day, I thought about how low maintenance is great but the result is lack of growth. It's the same with our walk with Christ. We can get away with the bare minimum and our relationship with Christ remains. If we want to see growth and have something exciting happen, we have to move past something that is low maintenance.

Our cats are not low maintenance, we feed them (way more than we should) we brush them, let them in and out, take them to the vet for check-ups and so on. We invest in them and in response we get cuddles and purrs and entertainment. We invest more and so we get more. Again, just like our walk with Christ. We get what we put in, the more we put into the relationship the more we get out, we see growth in our lives and in our connection.

You may have forgotten about our Discipleship Path, but I haven't. © Sometimes we need to go low maintenance, when life seems overwhelming but most of the time we need to grow. Where are you on that path? What areas do you need to grow? Where can I help? I give you permission to be like a moss ball on occasion but not for long. See what you need to move to the next level and see where Christ is leading you.





## October Edition What's Happening in a Glance



Hello, friends. This month, our KIDS ministry will be looking at the story of Paul and Barnabas. Paul was not always loved and respected by Christ's followers. He was first, a man hunting and capturing Christians because he did not believe yet that Jesus was who He said He was. Once Paul (who was originally named Saul) was blinded on the road to Damascus and met Jesus personally, he became a different person. Many people did not believe that Paul had changed for real. They were still afraid of him and worried that he was just pretending. A man named Barnabas saw Paul and recognized that his change of heart was genuine. He traveled with Paul and used his own reputation to help Paul earn the people's trust and preach about Jesus together. It is never easy to rebuild a broken reputation. Once people see someone as dishonest or untrustworthy, it is very difficult to build back trust. It is such a precious thing to be respected and seen as a good person. It was remarkable that Paul could rebuild his reputation. It is even more remarkable that Barnabas was willing to risk his own reputation in order to help a friend in need. He knew how important the message of Jesus was to the world and I think Barnabas knew that Paul's story would help others find Jesus, too. We do not know who God will use to show His love in this world. There is






















## Trinity UMC Annual Charge Conference Wednesday, November 5, at 6:30pm beginning in the Sanctuary

We will be the host church for a cluster of 5 charges.

#### What is a charge?

A charge refers to the appointment of a pastor to a church or ministry setting. The term has historical roots in the early Methodist movement, when local societies met in homes or shared spaces rather than dedicated church buildings. John Wesley appointed preachers to take "charge" of these societies—a term that endures today. A charge now refers to any church or entity to which a United Methodist pastor is appointed.

#### Is a charge the same as a church?

Sometimes, but not always. A charge may consist of a single congregation, but it can also include multiple congregations served by the same pastor. In these multi-church charges, congregations retain their individual identities while sharing pastoral leadership.

#### What is a charge conference?

A charge conference is an annual meeting of the leadership of a pastoral charge, held to make key decisions on behalf of the congregation(s). The meeting is presided over by the district superintendent. Voting members of the charge conference include all clergy appointed to the charge and members of the church council(s). Retired clergy and retired diaconal ministers who hold membership in any of the congregations are also members of the conference.

#### What are the duties of the charge conference?

The conference's responsibilities include the following:

- Reviewing and evaluating the overall mission and ministries of the charge
- Approving new lay leadership appointments and positions for the upcoming year
- Adopting a budget for all congregations within the charge
- Recommending candidates for ordained, lay or other forms of ministry
- Setting salaries and compensation for pastors and staff appointed by the bishop
- Supporting the formation of satellite congregations with the district superintendent's approval
- Reviewing annual membership records for each congregation

#### Why are charge conferences important?

Charge conferences provide a vital connection between local churches and their district superintendent. They reflect the connectional nature of The United Methodist Church, where decisions are made cooperatively by clergy, laity, congregations and connectional leadership. These conferences help ensure alignment in mission, accountability in leadership and continuity in ministry across the denomination. [adapted from resourceumc.org]


Stephen Ministry multiplies blessings throughout the church and community.
