Red Shoe Reflections with Rev. Kathryn



Spring is in the air, you can tell because everything is covered in yellow pollen. That also means that I find my eyes are a bit watery, my sinuses are not quite right, and my throat is a bit scratchy. Spring is here with its beautiful flowers, the trees are green again and the big, buzzy bees are back. But the pollen is rough!

A fun little fact for you, that yellow pollen that we see coating everything is not the pollen that makes our allergies act up. The yellow pine pollen that we see everywhere, those particles are big enough to see, therefore too large to affect our allergies. It is more likely to be maple, birch, or other smaller pollens that bother us. Yet we blame the big yellow pollen for our problems. Why not? It's there, we see it but it is not the source of our discomfort.

It makes me wonder, what else do we lay blame on only because it's most visible. Am I mad because the pharmacy ran out of my medicine or am I mad because I waited till the last minute to fill it? Am I upset because the car in front of me is driving too slow or because I am running late? Am I frustrated because I don't have time with God like I would like or am I frustrated with myself because I don't always make it the priority it should be? Do I lay blame on others when in reality I am embarrassed by my own mistake?

Jesus sat down and ate with sinners in the home of Matthew and the Pharisees were mad (Mt 9:10). Were the Pharisees jealous? Did they feel left out? Jesus tells them "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. But go and learn what this means: 'I desire mercy, not sacrifice. 'For I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners" (Matthew 9:12-13). I think Jesus knew which group was ready to hear His message and it was not the most righteous who may seem the obvious choice. It was the group who needed it most. That is who Jesus saw first.

I pray that I see who and what is more important even if it means looking past what seems to be the most prominent issue. I pray for eyes to see past the 'yellow dust' of my daily frustrations to the deeper needs of my soul and the people Jesus came to save.

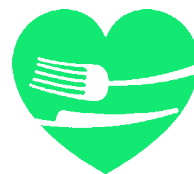

April



Our April Monthly Mission Offering will go to the Anderson Emergency Kitchen.

The mission of Anderson's Emergency Kitchen (AEK) is to address hunger. It is a weekday (M-F) feeding program that provides a hot nutritional meal to all in need who come through our doors. In the United Way of Anderson County's terminology, the AEK focus is to address basic needs. Our strategy is not a lofty strategy, but it is an essential one to the clients we serve. Many of them may not be able to get even one meal a day, and others are pressed to be food secure without these meals.

The AEK strategy for fulfilling its mission is to provide one hot nutritional meal to anyone who comes through our door five days a week.

In 2024, they served over 19,000 meals to residents of Anderson, that is around 75 meals a day, Monday—Friday. The AEK is located at 1527 South Main Street.

We are asking that Sunday School classes move to 9am for the summer schedule.

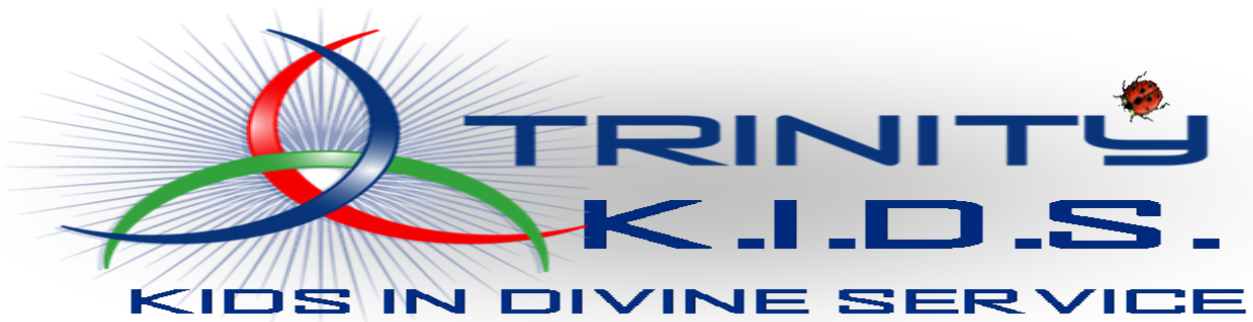

What's Happening in a Glance



Hello, friends. This month, the KIDS Ministry is looking at the story of David and Jonathan along with the Toy Story movie; You've got a friend in me! Imagine what a tough position it would be if your best friend's father was constantly trying to kill you. I have overcome some obstacles to a friendship in the past, but that is a doozy. Despite the struggles and tension created by this dynamic, Jonathan and David were friends. There are a ton of similarities in the Toy Story movie to this Bible story. Woody is jealous of the popularity of a new toy - Buzz. He was the favored toy by Andy (the little boy in the story) and he enjoyed his favor. Even though David was in line to be the next king, Jonathan was actually the rightful earthly heir; his father, Saul, did not like David being chosen or David's popularity and success. He became very jealous and it got ugly. Jonathan helped protect his friend from his dad, even though his dad was king and his own flesh and blood. The bond between these two friends was incredibly strong. Woody and Buzz had a pretty strong bond after going through their struggles to survive the world outside of Andy's room. It is through struggles that we forge the strongest bonds. Being there for one another is so powerful and we need people who are willing to show up no matter what. Jesus did. He showed up for us, each of us, to keep us safe and bring us safely home. Woody was not a mean toy who wanted to see Buzz destroyed, but... he was overcome with jealousy and that was not a good look for Woody. Buzz was clueless to how Woody felt and that did not help Woody's attitude. I think it might have made it worse. David was chosen to be king when he was very young and he had to wait a long time before he actually became king. He was not in a hurry to be king but that may have made Saul's attitude worse. David could have gotten frustrated and attacked Saul but he did not. He even tried to show Saul that he was not a threat to him when Saul stepped into a dark cave where David was hiding from him. He cut a small piece of cloth from Saul's clothing. When Saul was a very safe distance away, David called out to show him that if he had wanted to, he could have killed Saul while he was in the cave but he wanted peace instead. Woody risks his own life trying to save Buzz from the wild child, Sid, and rescue them both. It is his cave moment - save myself or us both? He chooses peace for them all and a true friendship is formed. Remind you of anybody else? Jesus chose peace when others would have run. He chose to sacrifice Himself so we could be saved. He chose you and me and we can be absolutely certain He says 'You got a friend in me.'

South Main Chapel & Mercy Center

A few times per year, we are honored to provide the meal for the South Main Chapel & Mercy Center, an incredible community of believers that focuses on care and compassion towards those struggling with homelessness and poverty. Frankly, South Main welcomes people that aren't always welcome anywhere else. They seek to be the hands and feet of Christ to the people who need it the most. We get to partner alongside them as we worship together and then share a meal. We meet at 2408 South Main Street (park behind the building in their parking lot) to deliver the food and then head into worship at 11. We serve the meal when the service ends around noon. We are usually cleaned up and ready to go around 1:00 PM.

Midweek Youth and Midweek in May

Our midweek Well will take a pause after **April 22nd** but in May, we will have Midweek in May Game Nights on May 6th, 13th and 20th from 5:30 - 7:00 pm, with a Bloodmobile Drive on May 13th. This is an opportunity for our youth to earn a \$500 grant by asking folks to donate blood that day from 3:30 PM - 7:00 PM. Please share this information with any family or friends who would be willing to donate for a great cause and to help out our youth for summer camp. They do not have to be Trinity members to support our blood drive. On the Wednesdays in May, we will have family friendly competition in a kids versus adults challenge and a couple of round table game night activities. Food will be provided but not from our amazing kitchen team. We will give them a break to just hangout and fellowship. We will have our Wednesday night donation boxes out to cover the cost of food.

Additional Service Opportunities:

Sunday Morning/Wednesday Night KIDS Ministry/Nursery - Youth are welcome to join us in the KIDS' wing from 9:55 - 10:55 AM on Sunday Morning to assist in science, craft, snack or story lessons. We are also actively seeking adults willing to invest in our young people and if you have thought about helping occasionally or regularly with our youth, we have lots of opportunities to serve. Our church and the future of the church depends on our continued efforts to make disciples who make disciples. We have room for you at the table. Come and see what is happening at Trinity with our youth. Disciple making is hard work but important work. We grow as we serve together.

Proposed Placement of Cremated Remains

A proposal has been made to the pastors and the Board of Trustees to establish a permanent placement of cremated remains at Trinity. Inurnments would be made for Trinity church members - other requests would be decided by the pastor. Inurnments could include an engraved marker, urns, and perpetual care. All the rules and regulations have not yet been established. The cost would be based on the design that is chosen and the cost of installing it. A design has not yet been chosen and the Business and Facilities Manager, David Ford, is researching all the necessary regulations. There are several designs that are being looked into. Spaces could hold two urns for couples or just one for an individual. Names, Birthdate, and date of death would be displayed.

Another way to memorialize a loved one could be offered for those of you who have already lost a spouse or loved one who is buried elsewhere. We could have bricks available that would be used in a walkway with your loved one's name engraved on it. Perhaps you have a parent, sibling, or child who was a Trinity member who passed years ago. A brick could be engraved for them also. Bricks will have a name only - no dates.

Please note that this is not a finalized or approved project. We would like to find out how many are interested in being inurned at Trinity before we can go further.
